
Hello and welcome to Recyke y'bikes 2024 annual report.

This is my second annual report now and I'm no less amazed and overwhelmed at the commitment and support from many for such a great charity, than I was when I wrote my first report.

It has been a tough year financially with a cost of living crisis, many bills for us have gone up and spares costing more. This means harder times for us as we navigate and constantly evaluate the work we do, but it also means that our beneficiaries are facing this storm too, and as a result, even more people are in need of a bicycle.

The bicycle really does hold the solution to many problems. Financial, health, social and environmental issues can be solved by having a bicycle, and we are committed to sharing this benefit as far and wide as possible. But we can only do this through continued work, funding and support from donors. Something which we have been blessed with through the years and continue to be thankful for!

We have continued to support staff development through apprenticeships and training, including the trustees supporting myself with a Level 7 apprenticeship in Strategic leadership. This goes hand in hand with our new strategy and vision which we are hoping to launch publicly in early 2025. There has been much hard work and amazing meetings gone into building the strategy and our direction for the future and I'm looking forward to sharing it with you all!

The shops continue to grow and support the charity, with demand for environmentally friendly and sustainable cycling products and servicing required more than ever before, we are seeing a benefit from this by having busy shops! They are a great outlet for us to provide support to keep bikes rolling and allow second hand parts to reduce costs to cyclists and prevent usable parts going to landfill. It's been great to see so many volunteers not only supporting outreach projects but the shops as well.

Over the year we welcomed Fran, Our new community engagement coordinator who has brought a passionate and lively energy to the charity. It's been a pleasure so far and I'm looking forward to working together in the future.

We also said goodbye to a number of trustees and welcomed exciting new ones. I'd like to thank Ben for his time as chair and my line manager and wish him all the best for the future. I'm pleased Graham has stepped up to take the role of chair and have enjoyed my time working with him so far, and again, looking forward to an exciting future ahead together.

I'd like to thank all the staff and volunteers for their efforts and involvements over the past year and can't wait to keep on working hard towards our vision in 2025 and beyond.

Referral bikes

In the last 12 months we've given away 215 referral bikes to people seeking asylum, refugees and families struggling financially.

Funding for this project, which includes replacement parts and staff time to refurbish and check the bikes and coordination of the scheme, came from The National Lottery Awards for All, for Byker, and NHS trust and Durham County Council for CLS. As usual demand has massively outstripped supply. There is a huge need for affordable, healthy, and reliable modes of transport, which will likely increase next year with the raise on the cap on a single bus fare. Our Referral bikes allow individuals to access key services, such as job interviews, school, GP appointments and also allows them to meet-up friends.

Our bikes help provide individuals with freedom, agency, fun and a form of exercise.

Women's sessions

Hi I just wanted to let you know that I had a great session this evening with Fran and Sara in the woman's maintenance session. I learned loads! As a single mum to two little ones with limited funds this session has been absolutely brilliant to make sure my little boys bike is in good safe condition for him what a lovely team you have too. xx

We've delivered women only repair sessions twice a month over the last year with sessions running from both shops. These sessions have provided a safe and supportive space for women to gain the skills to keep their bikes running well so that they can cycle with confidence.

LGBTQ+ sessions

The LGBTQ+ workshops were set up with help from Cycling UK and the Big Bike Revival.

Their goal is to:

- Inspire adults who don't currently cycle to begin
- Inspire those who have taken a break from cycling to return
- Inspire those who do cycle to start cycling more frequently

We identified a need in the local LGBTQ+ community and so arranged to deliver social and inclusive workshops to build confidence and interest. We hosted 4 workshops and 2 social rides over 4 months. The sessions were a great success and attendance was amazing.

Empowering communities

Street workshops



Our street repair workshops have now been running for several years and have grown to become an important part of summer for families in Byker and Walker where the cost of living crisis is having a significant impact, and alternative forms of transport are not always accessible. Delivered in partnership with Kids Kabin, the sessions enable us to combine the long standing relationships that Kids Kabin have with residents with our expertise, tools and parts.

The project has two main objectives: ensuring that kids' bikes are safe and properly looked after, and teaching children and young people how to maintain their own bikes. Children work out what needs fixed, select and reuse spare parts, and learn how to use a variety of bike tools both confidently and safely. Not only do they develop new skills, they also work together to help each other. The workshops enhance the problem solving and teamwork skills of young bike mechanics, building their confidence and giving them practical knowledge. They can then share this knowledge with others and have skills that will stay with them for life. We aim to leave young people empowered to choose cycling more as an active, healthy, and environmentally friendly way of getting around. Finally, workshops encourage children and families to work positively together in the streets and in parks, leading to stronger local relationships and greater community ownership of our places.

Empowering communities

Young volunteers

This year we've gained a lot of new young volunteers and it's great to see there's high demand from young people. Three members of the young volunteer group have now been coming for a couple of years and have built considerable knowledge and skills. They are now able to provide peer mentoring support for new young volunteers. During each session, Pete and Jen go through a range of tasks with the group and match tasks to participants depending on skill and experience level. A couple of the group are very keen to build their own bikes so we've been working on that a lot. It's wonderful to see them grow in confidence and feel pride in their achievements. In September the group participated in a workshop with Northumberland Wildlife Trust which they really enjoyed and it was good to see them having fun with an activity outside. We plan to take them out on a nature ride before the end of the year!

The kingdom of rust

Recycling/salvaging project

It's been a very busy year in the recycling/salvaging department. I'm not sure whether it's down to more people than ever before donating bikes or the cost of living crisis having a knock-on effect of making it harder for people to dispose of used bikes (local council prices making it expensive for households on limited budgets to dispose of bulky rubbish items). This is definitely the busiest year I've known for having to recycle bikes that don't make it for refurbishing.

Firstly, I want to give a big THANK YOU to all the wonderful volunteers that have helped in the task of dismantling bikes - it could not be done without your help. Recycling/scrapping is not the most glamorous of tasks - many think that building bikes is the ultimate job - but recycling is a hugely important part of the whole operation. It is an essential role in the functioning of Recyke y'bike, it's also a great way to begin to understand how bikes are put together and function, for anyone who is just starting out in the world of bikes. The scrapping room is also where some of the best conversations are to be had, everything from the study of yeasts, social clinics in Italy, Spain...ancient Greek earliest versions of the Bible, politics, music not to mention Gordon going on about sport (but I just put my head somewhere else and go to my happy place!)

The recycling of bikes has a few obvious benefits, the main one is providing parts for bike builds and reducing the cost of having to buy new parts from suppliers. I could not begin to put any kind of figure on what we are saving here but it must run into £ thousands per year. Second benefit is providing quality, rare, retro parts for eBay. Hopefully during the quieter winter months eBay selling can be resumed because we now have a nice sized stockpile of valuable bike parts. The third benefit is space management combined with a steady revenue from actual scrap metal prices (£9000/year on scrap metal value). Finally, there is the simple fact that scrapping has to take place in order to free up space in an already crowded environment.

A couple of other facts to mention here. An aluminium frame fully stripped down has a value of around 90p, a steel framed bike has a value of around 10p, these values fluctuate according to scrap metal prices changing all the time. The time taken to strip a bike down is around half an hour, again that depends on the condition of the bike - how rusty it is, if it has been dredged out of a garden pond or just a bike someone no longer has use for. So there is a constant trade-off between value and time taken to dismantle. This only works because Recyke y'bike has some great volunteers happy to give their time.

I'm also going to mention Fran here, after a lot of hard work, searching around, cajoling and persuading she has managed to secure funding for a supported volunteer project, which I'll be doing in the not too distant future, on Tuesdays with people who are seeking asylum. The aim here is to help them feel integrated into the community, achieve some qualifications (Velotech), have somewhere to go and do something creative and absorbing as well as meet other people. Not to mention just for them to get out for a day and put their heads somewhere else, albeit for a brief moment. Thank you Fran for your hard work and dedication to the project!
